Field Trip Planned August 24

Botanical Garden of Northwest Michigan - Traverse City

In October 2010, our Guest Speaker, Karen Schmidt, Board Chair from the Botanical Garden of Northwest Michigan (Traverse City) gave an overview of the Landscape Architect plans from the firm of Nelson, Byrd, Wolz. As funding allows, the Master Plan allows the gardens to be built one section at a time. She requested all the northern Michigan Garden Clubs, Inc. in District V join in and write letters of endorsement.

Nearly, a year later, we are going to go visit the site as a Field Trip planned by Roseann Kujawa, 2nd Vice President of Programs. On Wednesday August 24th, interested Members will head to the old Traverse City State Hospital. The 25 acres holds the Historic Barns Park and has a wide range of ecosystems ---meadows, woodlands and wetlands.

When all systems are go, there will be a variety of display, demonstration and research gardens designed and planted. These will surround the barns. The Old Granary is slated to be a Visitors' Center and stone foundation of the old Horse Barn is becoming a walled garden where



native Michigan wildflowers will bloom.

SEEDS, an ecological solutions 501c3 utilizes 5 acres of this property. In 2010, they harvested more than 1500 pounds of produce from 25 unique crops. They have an intern farming program and use the Community Supported Agriculture (CSA) model.

Community Supported Agriculture

Recently, at the 2011 Michigan Garden Clubs, Inc. State Convention in Midland, CSA farming was discussed. A CSA consists of a community of individuals who pledge support to a farming operation with the growers and consumers sharing the risks and benefits of food production. The system results in a weekly delivery or pick up of vegetable produce in a box. Sometimes, boxes can include fruit, dairy and meat. There are a variety of reasons consumers turn to a CSA: Fresher than supermarket, quality of food (organic), farmers can sell directly to the public, a relationship is developed with your farmer, helps local economy and price is usually good.

This concept began in Germany in the 1960s by Rudolf Steiner. The idea caught hold in Japan in 1965 as Mothers were concerned about the rise of imported food. The first CSA was established in New Hampshire in the United States by Jan VanderTuin in 1984 and the concept has spread in this country. CSA's use organic and biodynamic gardening. This means sustainable ways are emphasized such as composts and manure. Artificial fertilizer and toxic pesticides and herbicides are strictly avoided. Fermented herbal and mineral preparation are used as well as planting calendars and astronomical sowing.

Medicine Wheel Garden

With the 2012 Michigan Garden Clubs, Inc. State Convention "Honoring Mother

Earth" in District V next year, we are tapping into our northern Michigan and Native American history past. The Botanical Garden site is a working on establishing a Medicine Wheel Garden someday in the future.

These Medicine Wheels are

called "sacred hoops" and are constructed by laying stones in particular patterns on

the ground. They follow a basic pattern of having center stones and an outer ring with spokes radiating. Various astronomical, spiritual, ritual, healing and teaching has been practiced from these structures.

Build Your Own Medicine Wheel Garden

In the book, *The Medicine Wheel Garden: Creating Spaces for Healing, Celebration and Tranquility* by E. Barrie Kavasch, the stone circle is divided in four quadrants, north, south, east and west with recommended Native plants for woodland shade, prairie, sunny and coastal environments. As an Ethno botanist and Herbalist, he designs special spaces for balancing life. Newsletter

House #1 - Hal and Anita Lawnichak 1563 Winterland Drive After building their new home, each year new sections of gardens were developed especially island beds to add interest. By interspersing birdbaths and butterfly bushes throughout the yard there is constant sound and activity from bees, birds and butterflies in their shade to partial shade perennial filled gardens.



House #2 - Mike and Jeanne Freymuth 3100 N. Townline Road The lawn started disappearing after Jeanne took the Michigan State University Extension Master Gardener course. Because of too much shade and poor sandy soil where grass would not grow, Mike "gave" her those areas to garden. Inspired by Patricia Lanza's book "Lasagna Gardening", she set out to make rich soil using Pat's method and built a huge backyard woodland border garden which can be enjoyed inside or out. Come see for yourself, between the topsoil in the front and backyard.



House #3 - Jacob and Nancy Kurth 3473 Theisen Road Upon arriving at this home, one of the first things you come upon in the distance, is a gazebo and a two acre manmade pond fully stocked with fish. Walking up from the pond is a cozy little garden tucked between the back patio and the garden shed! This 45 acre setting has an expansive lawn, a drive through an allée of trees and an antique fountain on the front side.



House #4 - Mike and Donna Jones 3810 Theisen Road Gardening has been a passion for a number of years with many of their perennials coming from their Grandparents. With numerous flower beds, fruit trees and berry bushes, ornamental tress and shrubs, the main centerpiece is the enormous flower garden contained by low stone walls



House #5 - Terry and Ann Kureth 1895 West Martin Lake Road Two ideas inspired these gardens: First, do no harm as the property is filled with Spring wildflowers and thousands of trilliums. Second, garden with wildlife habitat in mind. An intriguing "river" of moss runs in a mostly shady area now an easy care spot of glowing green.



House #6 - Bob and Jan Palmbos 5141 Greenview Drive Bordering Gaylord Country Club Golf Course, these gardens began in 2003 when they asked for garden wedding gifts. They received plant cuttings, bulbs, herbs, and garden art. Bob's woodworking creations fill the gardens which include benches, birdhouses and a wheel house water feature. They rely on some annuals, but have mostly perennials. These gardens can be enjoyed by sitting on the large deck and under the pergola.

Habitat for Humanity House #17



When the snow broke in May, Members of the Habitat for Humanity Committee, (from left to right) Georgia Maxwell, Marlene Everett, Joy Hanje, Tami Gray and Linda Reinhardt, Chair and the Homeowners' son, teamed to dress up the property from their move in date last November. Linda worked with the Homeowners to design both a perennial garden and a "veggie pot" to provide some freshly grown vegetables this summer. The Membership donated shrubs and perennials from their own personal gardens. "It was fun and fairly easy," said Linda. "We had a lot of plants, so we ended up leaving some for a rock garden they are putting in the back." The Homeowner who received the Patrick McNamara House had her flowers on the other

side of the front porch all planted and with red mulch. Linda reports , "So we put in topsoil, a bag of Dairy Doo, and the red mulch also." Primrose and Grape Hyacinth from Lois Kalis at East Courthouse were transplanted. A new Women's League golfer gave us 2 Hosta, 2 Astilbe, 2 Coral Bells and 1 Seedum. A new neighbor, gave Linda a big clump of red Hens and Chickens--- some went into the garden and some to Member, Tammy Fair-

child, who was conducting a school classroom activity of making succulent wreaths. Georgia Maxwell and Marlene Everett both brought plants too - Forget Me Nots, Lily of the Valley, grape

hyacinth, etc. Marlene bought some herbs and made a pretty herb pot for the back porch. Linda also put one of our Edelweiss Garden Club flags on a stake in the garden so it can be viewed from the road.

The Committee still keeps track of previous homes



and how their Landscaping and Gardens are being maintained. They educate the Homeowners and help purchase items they may need such as garden tools and hoses for maintenance.

Our club now has helped seven new homes in conjunction with Habitat of Humanity's Director, Donna Quandt.

In 1999, a partnership was formed between National Garden Clubs, Inc. and Habitat for Humanity. Emphasis is on enhancing the environment by landscaping HFH Homes, landscaping with hearty native trees, shrubs and plants that also attract butterflies.

Soil Results: Low in Potassium



A common thread of "low in potassium" was throughout the testing of our nine gardens in a diagnosis received from Michigan State University's Soil

Testing Lab. Note: The Roundabout was above average in all categories and it's soil was pure compost from the Department of Public Works Garage and Yard at 102 E. Seventh Street. Joan Collick, Planting Chair and Roseann Kujawa, Master Gardener and the I-75 Rest Area Garden Chair, collected the samples and took the results to Brad Morgan of Morgan Composting. He personally met with them at the Gaylord Regional Airport Conference Room to review the findings and set up organic guidelines to improve the soil.

For the summer, Nature Safe Fertilizer was distributed to Gardens to be sprinkled very lightly, just like Osmocote. He brought K&S+ (potash and sulfur) because our beds are low in potassium. This is also sprinkled very lightly about one Tablespoon per plant and even lighter where plants are close together or small. Work it into the soil and water, keeping it off the leaves. (Gloves are needed for this product.) Several times during the summer, fish fertilizer can be used when plants do not look alert. The liquid requires a spray bottle with a ratio of 4 oz. to one gallon of water and spray on the foliage. In the fall, a blend of compost will be delivered to match our test results.

Opal Lake Beach House Stuffed Jalapenos

They do look a little sandy rolled in the dried breadcrumbs ---but full of zip in flavor and packed with 66% Vitamin C and 14% Vitamin A (total daily nutrition needs).

12 fresh green/or red jalapenos peppers 2-1/2 to 3 inches long

1 cup shredded cheddar cheese (4 ounces)

1 3-ounce package cream cheese, softened

1/2 teaspoon dried Italian Seasoning, crushed

2 eggs

from Planting Day Potluck

1 tablespoon milk

2/3 cup fine dry bread crumbs

Guacamole and/or dairy sour cream

- Cover a large baking sheet with foil. Set aside. Cut each pepper in half lengthwise. Remove seeds and membranes. Stir together cheddar cheese, cream cheese and Italian seasoning in a medium mixing bowl. Spoon some of the cheese mixture in each pepper half.
- Place bread crumbs in a shallow bowl. Dip each pepper half into egg mixture and roll in bread crumbs. Place pepper halves, filled side up, on the prepared baking sheet. Bake in 325 degree oven about 30 minutes or until tender and heated through. Serve with guacamole or sour cream. Makes 24.
