Tool Shelf Reuse those old kitchen tools!

<u>Attach a soap dish</u> with soap to a nail brush to the side of your potting bench. Dig your fingernails into the soap before you begin working in the garden.

<u>Old serving pieces</u>—ladles, knives, spoons and forks—to use as digging and transplanting tools.

<u>Wire wisks</u> or an old egg beater to whip up your home-brewed bug potions and fertilizers.

<u>A paper-towel dispenser</u> mounted near your work are means you'll always have towels for quick and easy cleanups.

<u>An apple corer</u> makes a miniature dibber for tiny bulbs like muscari, galanthus, and leucojum.

<u>Kitchen and barbecue tongs</u> for picking up offensive things like slugs and pulling up stinking nettles.

<u>Long handed wooden-spoons</u> or spatulas for bouncing bugs off plants and for mixing batches of compost tea, potting soils, and fertilizers.

<u>Old colanders or laundry baskets</u> for harvesting fruits and vegetables.

Plant a Row for the Hungry

According to the President of the Michigan Garden Club, Nancy Stark, many communities are now planting gardens for the hungry or "planting a row for the hungry". It is the resurrection of the former "Victory Gardens" seen during WWII. President Stark proposes that since we have already planned and planted our gardens, there is still room to fit some vegetable plants with our flowers. She recommends that at some point taking a former flower garden and develop a plan to grow vegetables for a nearby shelter or organization.

President Joan would like to support President Stark's recommendation and invite the club to participate in this worthwhile cause. To continue in this effort, Mr. Jerry Coger, board member and coordinator of Gaylord's Food Pantry, will be joining our meeting Wednesday, February 8th. Mr. Coger will be sharing with us the need for this action as well as the kinds of vegetables that most desired.

Judi Doan, Food Pantry Vice-Chair, shared that in 2011, there were 6.092 people who came to the food pantry for assistance. The number of families that participated were 1,834 of which 695 were children between 0 to 5 years old.
