Plant by the Moon

Gardening by the Moon is an interesting technique that claims that you can speed up the germination of your seeds by working with the forces of nature. Available at the site are resources that provide information such as the best day for planting based upon the phase and sign of the moon.



Each month in the <u>Planting Guide</u>, describes garden activities based upon our growing season and tells you when it is a fertile time to plant. The lunar gravitational pull increases the moisture in the soil at the time of the new and full moon, encouraging germination and growth. The claim is, by working with the forces of nature you can have a more abundant harvest.



HeadWaters Land Conservancy is a Michigan based 501c3 non-profit land trust comprised of a staff, Board of Directors, Volunteers, and Members. And like us, share in the mission of protecting and preserving the remaining undisturbed natural resources of northeast Michigan. These natural resources include regionally important agricultural lands, undeveloped tracts of forests for both timber and wildlife habitat, scenic landscapes, and perhaps the most important, the protection of our fresh water resources. The largest natural lands left in all of Lower Michigan are right here in our backyard. During the last century, this landscape has dramatically begun to change, and at a faster rate than it has been conserved. HeadWaters Land Conservancy was established in response to such unprecedented growth. Since its beginnings in 1994, the Conservancy has been serving people—those here today, who have the foresight to preserve such special places — and those of future generations, who will benefit from our endeavors. Today, thousands of acres have been permanently protected with the help of dedicated supporters. We can help in two ways: as a Supporter which will allow the Conservancy to continue protecting our lands and rivers.
