### TENDING TO YOUR ROSES

Rose cones and other winter protection are designed to keep the plants frozen, not warm. Premature warming may cause the plants to break dormancy, only to be injured when the weather returns to winter. If the weather becomes warm and sunny, vent the rose cones to let the heat out. Some cones are made with removable covers,; others are not. Cut a few holes in the sides near the tops to let the heat out. The greatest damage to roses occurs in late winter when the weather is unusually warm and suddenly turns very cold. The native plants seem to tolerate it, but introduced or marginally hardy plants can be severely hurt.
