New Members


Welcome to three new members:



... Many, many years ago when I stated gardening at my home, I was certain a full-sun plant would thrive in full shade. Or, a 15-foot shrub could easily be managed and controlled to retain a petite 3 feet. So I ask: Who wants to spend the summer hedging an enormous shrub? More importantly, it is not a sustainable practice.

Two things we want to avoid: working hard in our gardens and creating more waste. Remember, I am a lazy, cheap gardener who does not like to waste money. I am, however, a huge advocate of professional landscape designs; they are worth their weight in gold. When I first discovered the joy of gardening, I spent oodles of money trying to figure out what works, and what does not. A plan in hand would have been a wise investment. Remember you can implement the project in phases as your budget allows. In the end, you will have a cohesive landscape design to enjoy for years to come.....
