




Railroads played a key role in the development of Otsego County. They connected us to the rest of the world. Three railroads provided passenger and freight service to our county: Jackson, Lansing & Saginaw (later Michigan Central then New York Central), Grand Rapids & Indiana (later Penn Central), and the Boyne City, Gaylord & Alpena. The first two began operating here in the early 1870s. The B.C.G.&A. ran here from 1905 until the 1930s.

There were also several temporary logging railroads that sprawled throughout Otsego County. They made it possible to reach rich holdings of valuable lumber that were located too far for river transportation. They also served the various lumber camps and created nearly 20 settlements that are now Ghost Towns.

Today, Lake State Railway provides freight service to Gaylord. Tracks from the other railroads have been removed.
