

History Detectives are hard at work solving history mysteries

Here's a sample of some of the efforts currently under way by our team of History Detectives. Jane Brink (shown to the left with her husband Charles) is credited for being the first white female to live in Otsego County. A long time "history mystery" was: When did she die? Her head stone in the Otsego Lake Township cemetery indicates the year was 1899 but she is listed in the 1900 Census. No death certificate could be found and the Herald Times archives begin at 1903 so these years aren't covered.

Maybe other newspapers printed her obituary. The Brinks moved here from Almont in Lapeer County and Jane had returned there at one time for health reasons. No on-line newspapers from Almont were found so the search turned to the Grayling newspaper. The Crawford County Avalanche is available on the internet. A quick search discovered Jane died on April 22, 1900 at Otsego Lake Village. The mystery is solved!

Sue Ciszewski shared the Michigan National Guard poster (shown to the left) of Company H, 125th Infantry. Her grandfather, Tony Pomarzynski, is among the more than 250 soldiers and officers that served from mid-1916 to October 1917. They mobilized at Camp Ferris in Grayling, went to Texas, and later journeyed to Sault Ste. Marie, Michigan.

Using the free access to Ancestry.com through the Otsego County Library, we discovered government documents for Company H that listed each person's home town. About 10 were from Otsego County.
