

Cemeteries are great sources of local historical information. They are tangible memorials to the people who were here before us. Reading the names on the headstones remind us of days gone by and those responsible for creating our present world. We recognize family names still familiar today as well as those that have faded into history. A valuable lesson in the circle of life.

It's interesting to see the various sizes and styles of headstones. How they've changed over time may help explain shifts in values, beliefs, and economic conditions. The way in which people choose to leave their legacy for future generations continues to evolve.





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Find A Grave is a convenient web site to look up burials in Otsego County. Other sources of information include the archives at the Otsego County History Museum, and the Otsego County Library. Numerous publications have been produced that contain the inscription of each head stone. However, not all graves have head stones or may have one that is no longer legible. To locate a specific burial site, it will be helpful to have the plot number, designated section, and a map of the cemetery.

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Even though names and dates are "etched in stone" it's still necessary to verify the information found on grave markers. For example, Jane Brink's head stone (photo below) shows 1899 as the year she died. However she was listed in the 1900 Census.

As revealed in our History Matters Update #30, Jane's obituary showed she died on April 22, 1900. Mistakes can happen – even with our county's first female pioneer – so be sure to double check the facts and verify all information with multiple sources.
