Gable Front Family/National Folk Style (after 1850):

Simple gable front homes were dominant during the pre-railroad and railroad-expansion eras. Historic photos show the home had two centrally located fireplaces and simple skinny-clapboard siding. The homes' gable front and columned front porch were meant to echo the typical façade of a Greek temple. More recent photos show the come was "craftsman-ized", most l likely during 1915-1925, with the addition of the rubble stone fireplace, rough siding, fish-scale shingles and rectangular porch columns.
